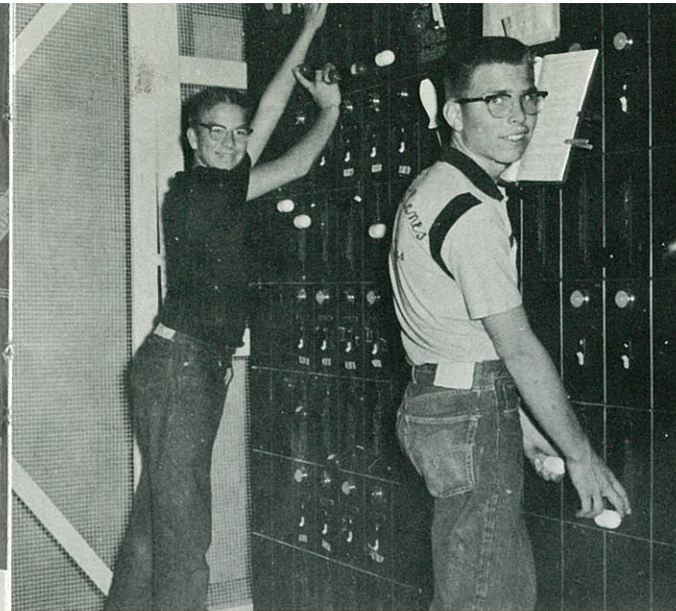

Homecoming Brings Exes Back

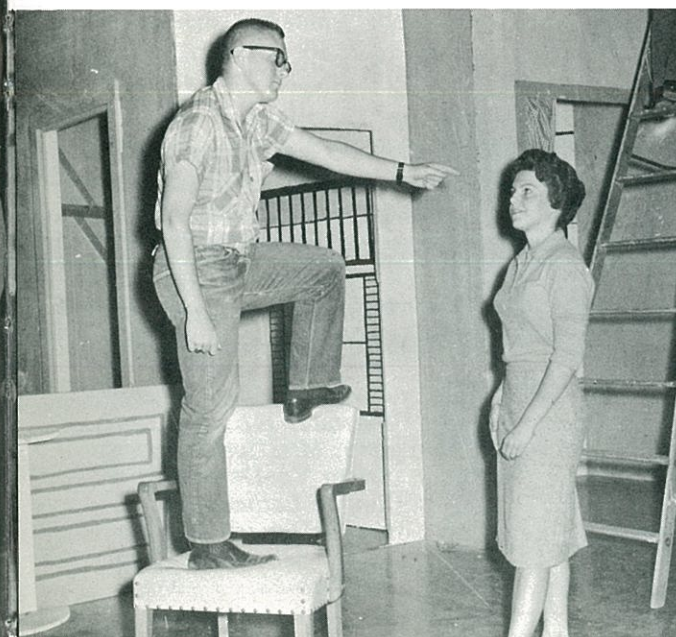

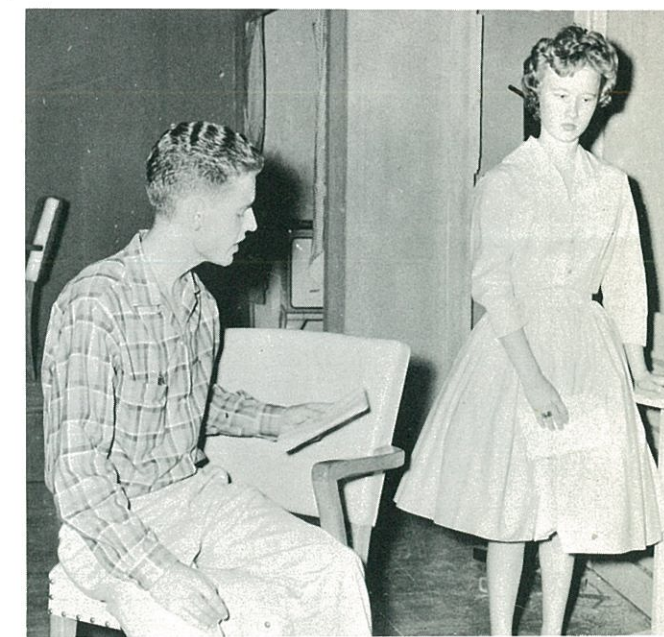


The color-pinning ceremony is the highlight of the Homecoming Pep Rally.
