## Homemaking, Industrial Arts, Improve Skills

The four Homemaking courses provide opportunities for students to gain knowledge which contributes to an increased understanding of self, family, and friends, and skills in decision making and assuming responsibility with less dependence on adults. It provides learning experiences pertaining to the needs and interest of family, housing, foods, clothing, relationships, health, care of the sick, and child care. Supervised home experiences reinforce class learning, making the home a part of the instructional laboratory in all homemaking courses.

The Industrial Art Courses include General Metal, General Woodworking, Woodworking II, General Drafting, Pre-Engineering Drafting, Welding, and General Electricity. Each of these classes specialize in its own field.


