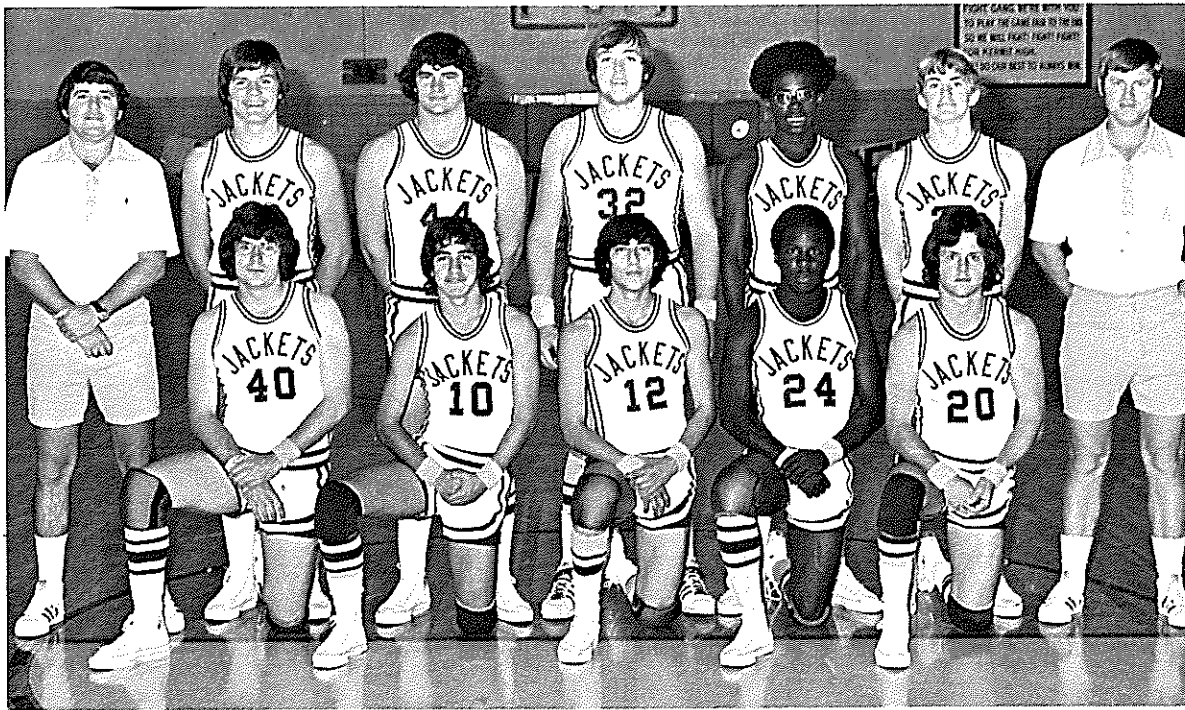

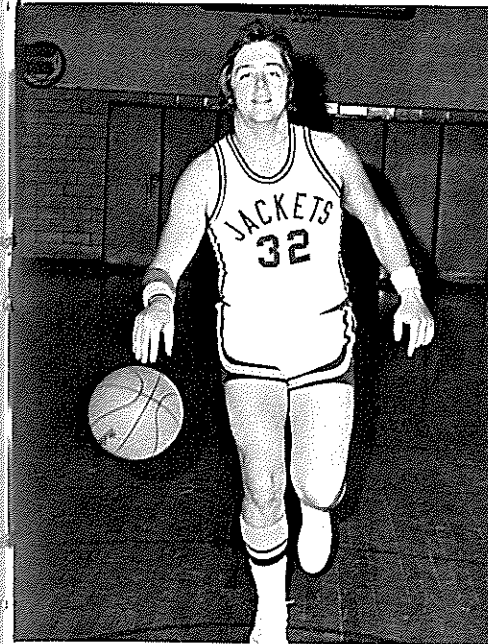

Cagers Have Successful Season



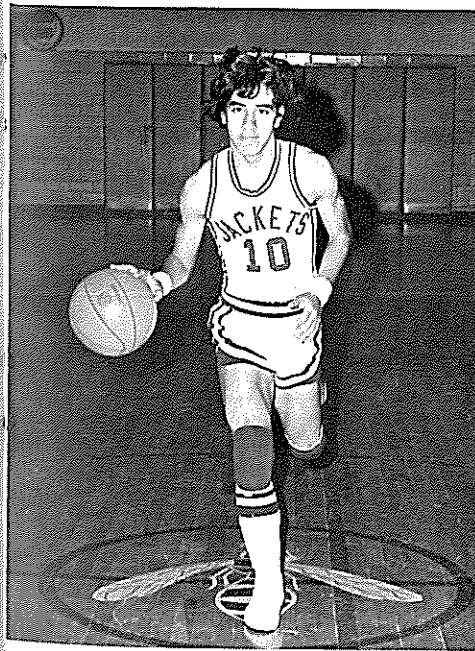

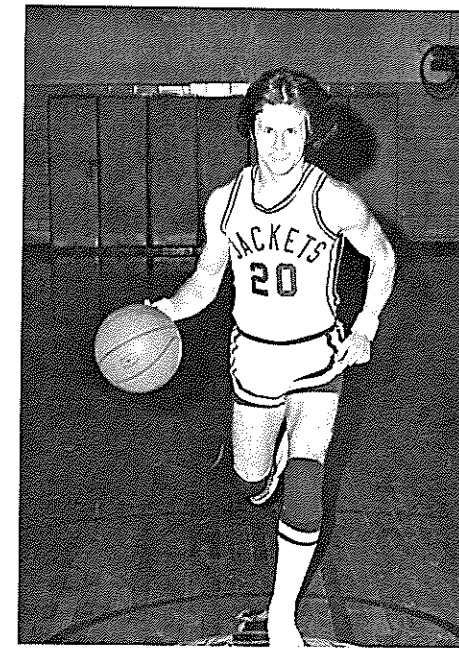

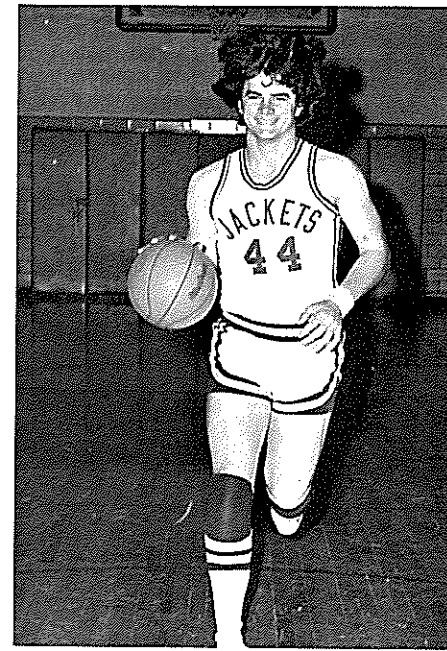
During the first quarter of play the Jackets jumped out to take a three point lead.

Kermit point-makers in the third quarter included Watson with 7, Haygood with 4, Roark with 3 and Montie Wren with one point.

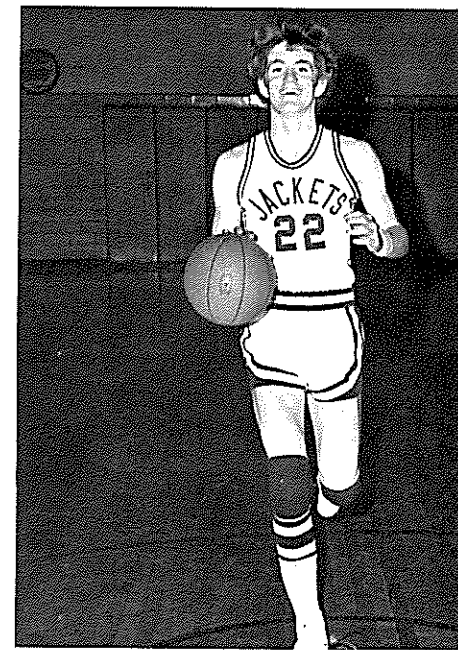
