

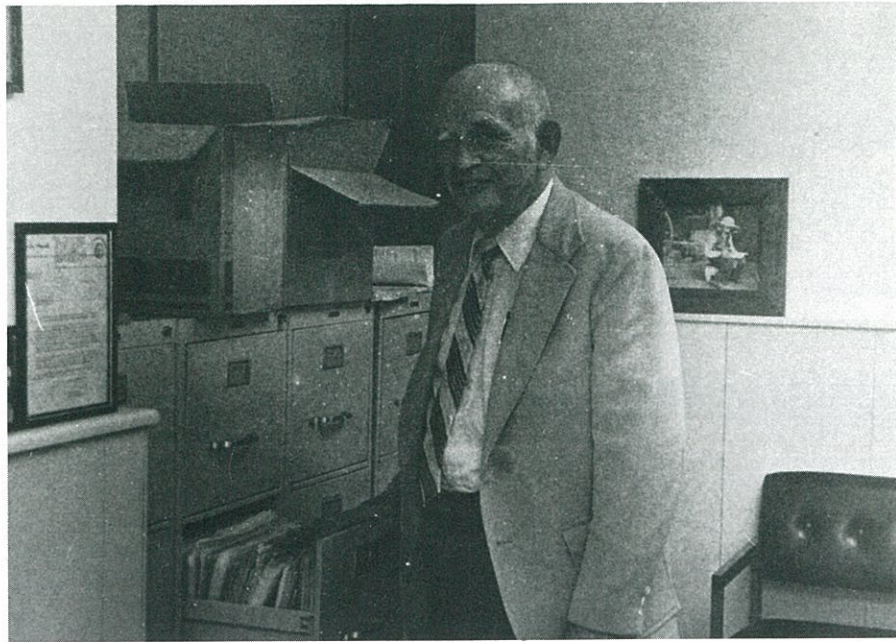
Principals See Changes In Education

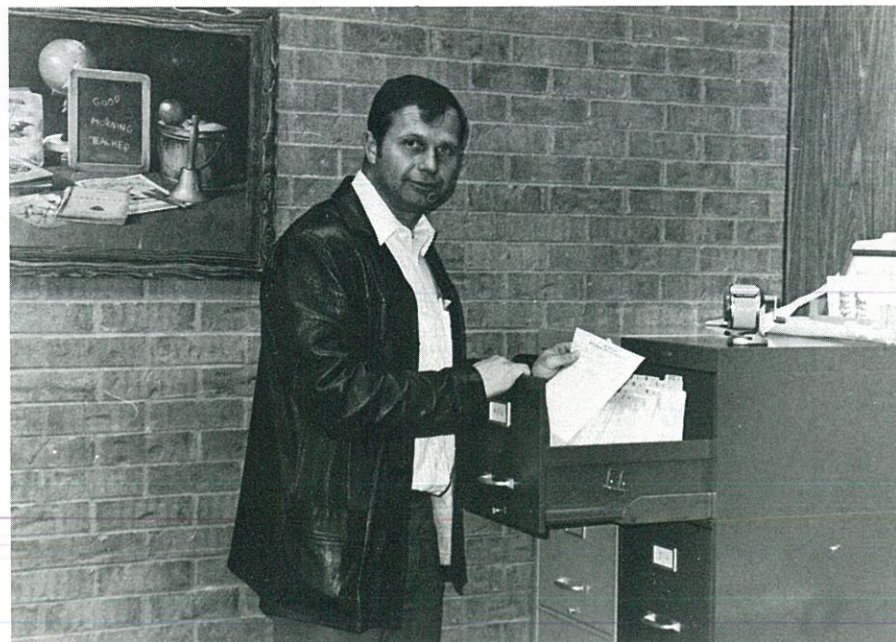

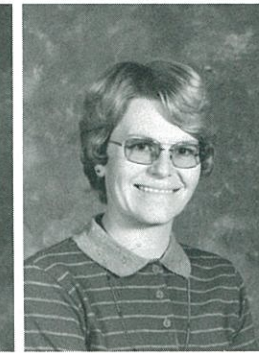

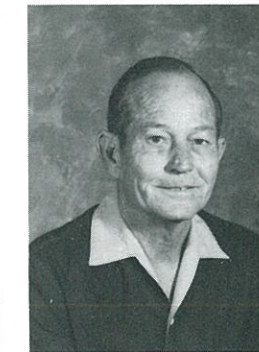
