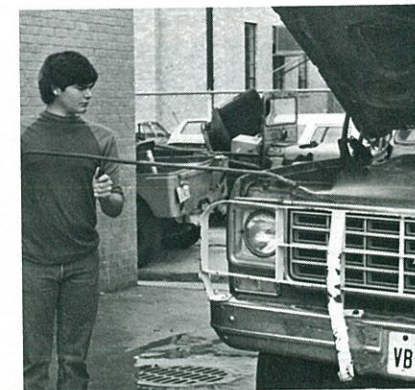
Bonnie Way, Wink, Texas.

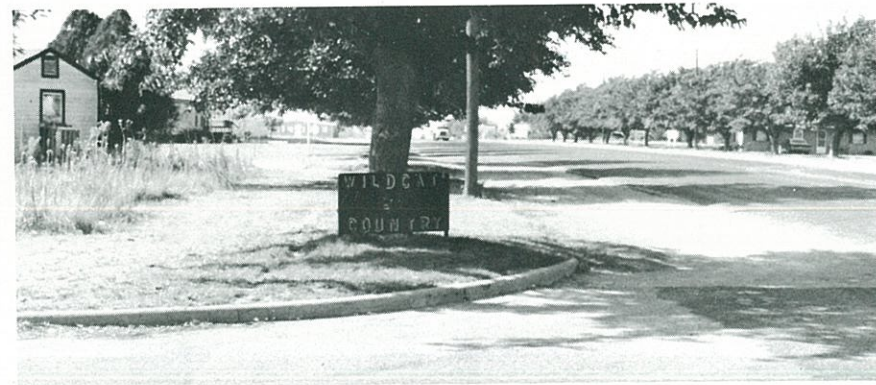
