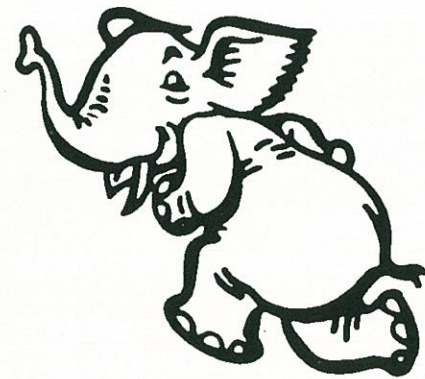


The Newsmakers Of 1988-89 . . .

The 1988 Summer Olympics took place in Seoul, Korea. After it was all over the total medals for the U.S.A. was 94. The Soviet Union came in first with 132 medals, while East Germany came in second with 102 medals.

"World's Fastest Man," Canadian Ben Johnson, competed at the Summer Olympics, but later was stripped of his world record and gold medal when tests showed he had taken steroids.

Janet Evans, a 17-year old schooler, wins a gold in the 400-meter freestyle at the Summer Olympics beating her world record by 1.6 seconds.



In an airshow at Ramstein Air Force Base in W. Germany, three Italian jets collided, sending one jet into a crowd of 300,000 spectators, causing the deaths of 70 people.

Since the Challenger disaster in 1986, the Space Shuttle Discovery was finally launched without any complications or difficulties.

After being trapped for three long weeks, three California gray whales were rescued from the frozen waters of Alaska.

1989. This year marked the end for mass-murderer, Ted Bundy. He died in the electric chair after many years of appealing his death sentence.

Superbowl XXIII. The San Francisco 49ers made a touchdown with 34 seconds left in the game, defeating the Cincinnati Bengals 20 to 16.

Barry Sanders, tailback for Oklahoma State, won the Heisman Trophy for 1988.

Tom Landry, Dallas Cowboy coach for 29 years, was replaced this year by Jimmy Johnson.

Bobby McFerrin must have had a very good year. His song "Don't Worry, Be Happy" and his album of the same title won Song and Album of the Year at the Grammy Awards.

At the American Music Awards these songs were voted favorite in their categories: "Sweet Child O' Mine"-Guns and Roses (pop/rock); and "Deeper Than a Holler"-Randy Travis (country).

One-time resident of Wink, Roy Orbison, 52, died of a massive heart attack at his home in Hendersonville, Tennessee. He sang such songs as Pretty Woman and Crying. His comeback album was scheduled for release in February, but he died before its release. As a result, the State of Texas has officially set April 23 aside as Roy Orbison Day.

In the 1988 World Series the L.A. Dodgers upset the Oakland A's four games to one.
