Melinda Smith and Twila Collins cheer for the team, feeling self-confident in their appropriate horizontal lines.

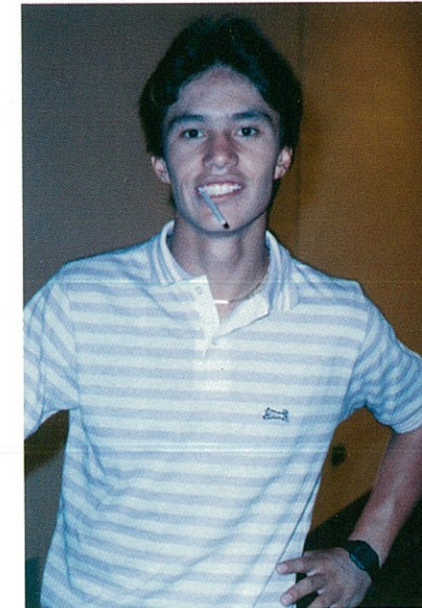
The fans got into the spirit of the game as well as the dress of the day.
