This was also the year that the Wildcats' came back from an 0-9 season to clinch a play-off spot and the girls' basketball program, in its first season, played a JV schedule.


Another new accomplishment involved the Wildcat yearbook staff using two new Apple Macintosh computers to produce the yearbook and newspaper.
