

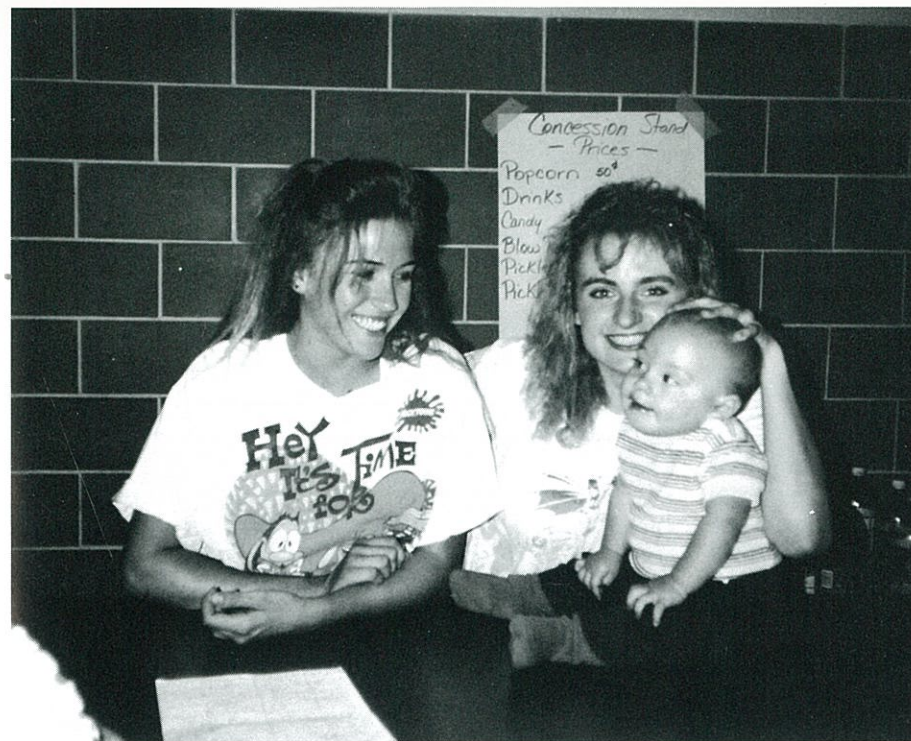
Students grasp responsibilities with maturity

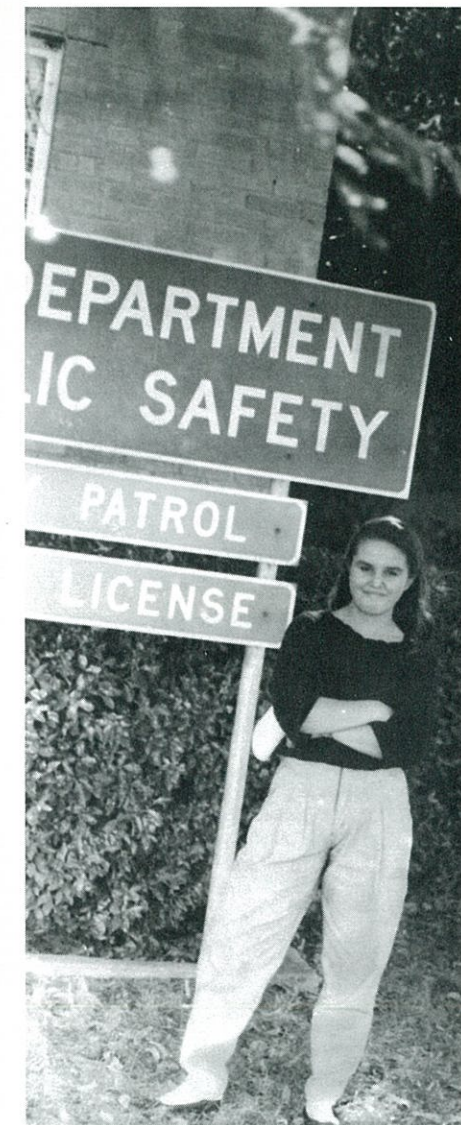
