

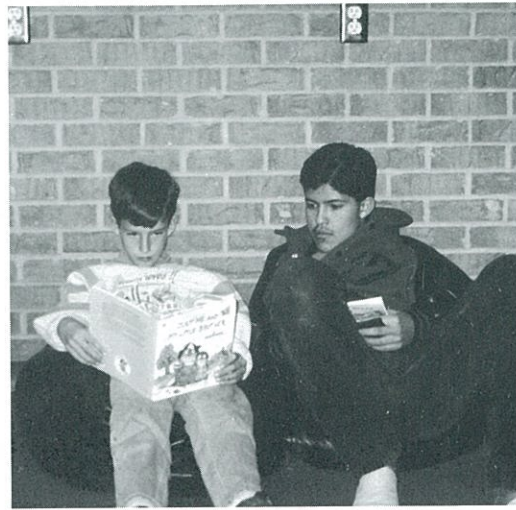
Peer Assisted Leaders

Damien Martinez listens carefully to his pal John Paul Jones.



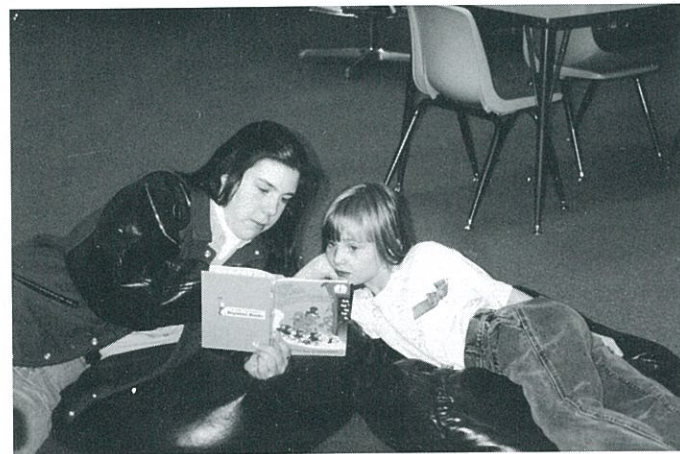

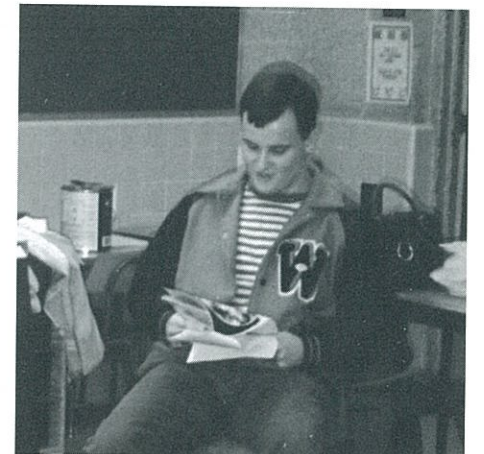
