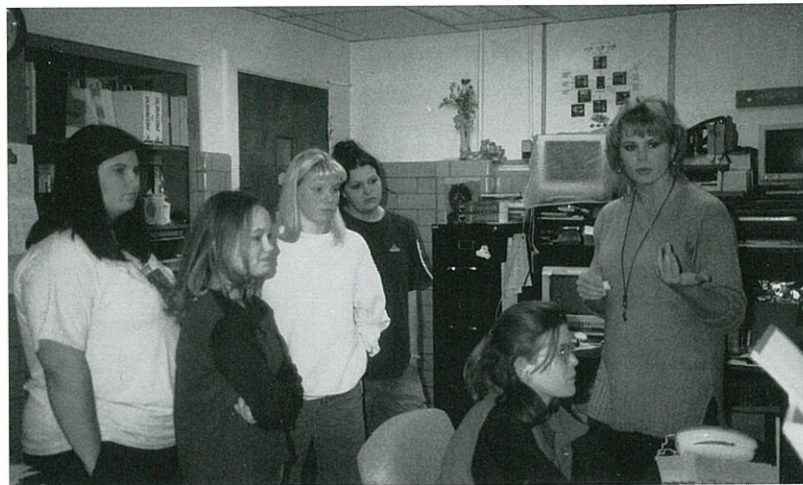


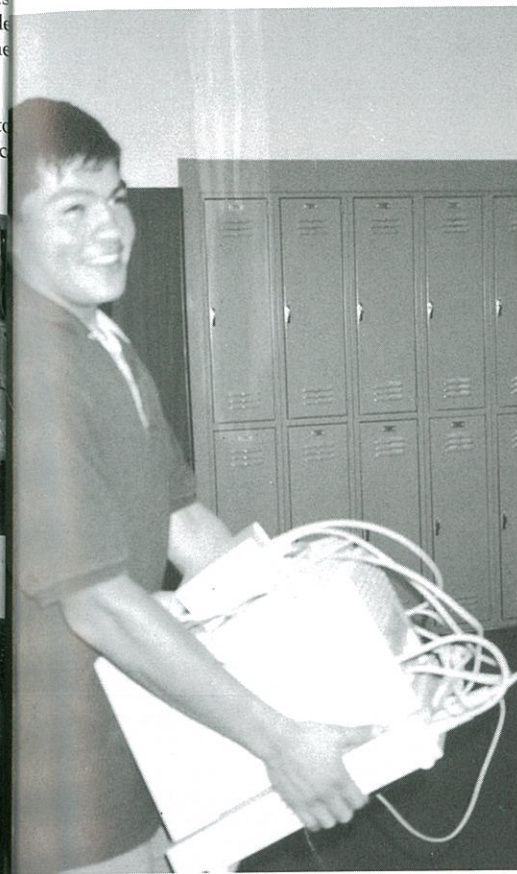
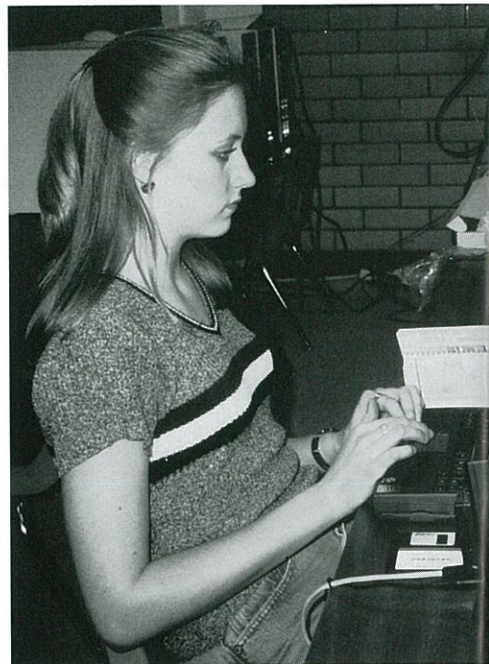
Let's Go Surfin'

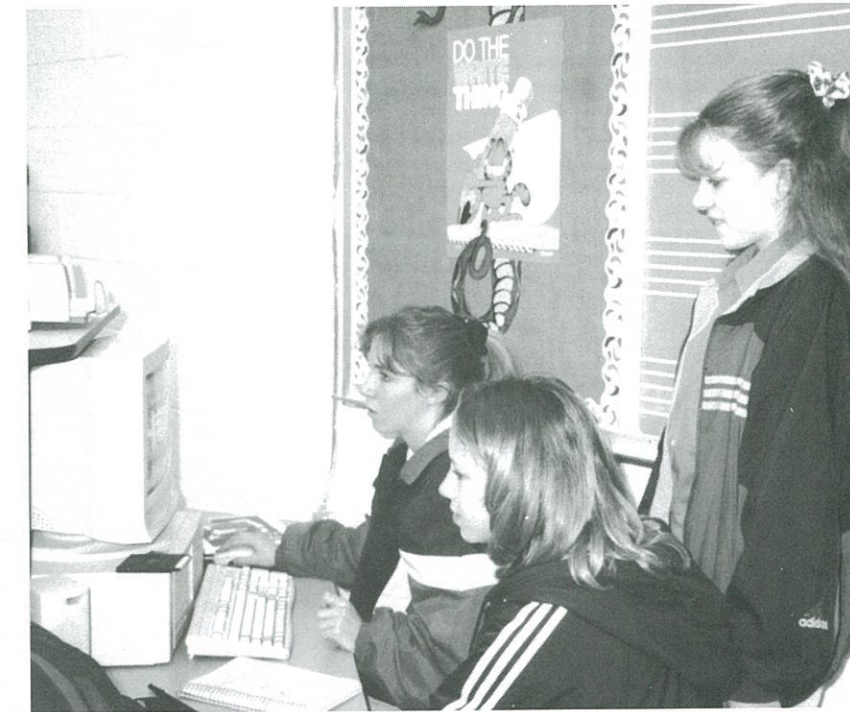

The internet is a great place to roam and learn information. My favorite place on the web is www.teen.com. At this site, I can chat with others or read my horoscope.



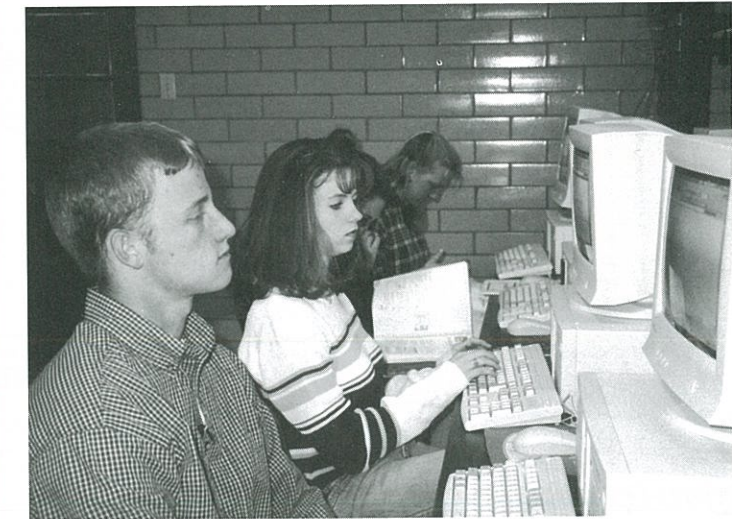
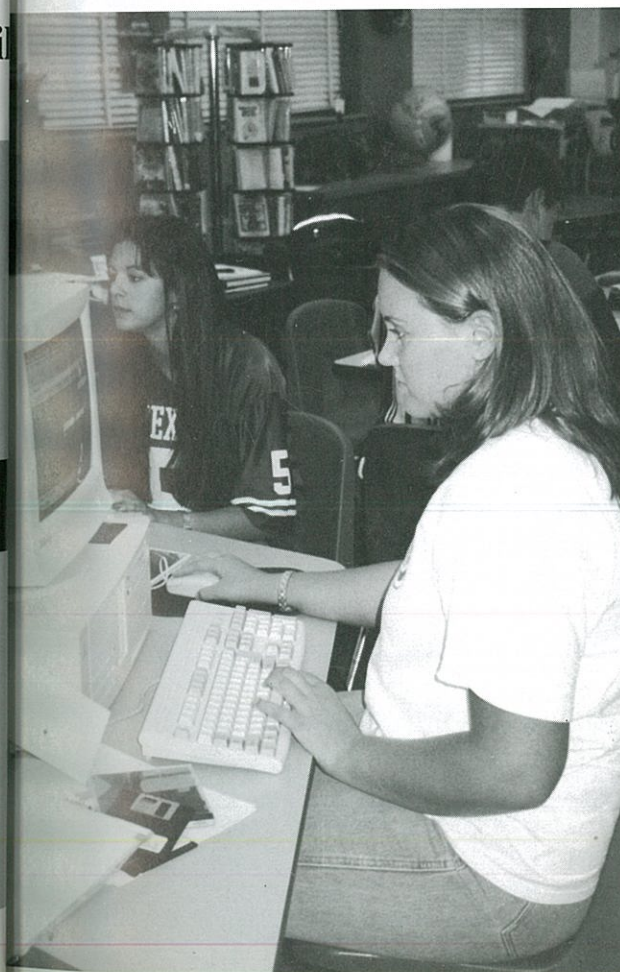
